- Started with >110,000 English terms
- Other languages ranging from 8,000 to 60,000 (DE)
- Cleaning up resources Reduce EN to 93,000
- Language Equality
 - 93,000 terms in all EU languages too €€€ without automation
 - Mining data for translations
 - **••** DB grew from 400,000 to 2.1m terms
- Conceptual clustering
 - Non essential entries removed DB shrunk to 1.5m terms
 - Semi-automatic creation of 50,000 meaning clusters
- Taxonomy built for the top layers and concepts linked

This totals **over € 4.7 trillion** annually.




