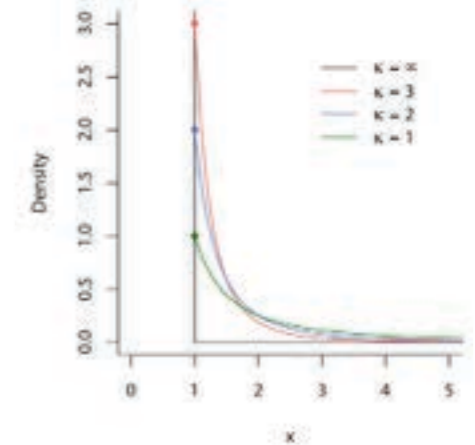

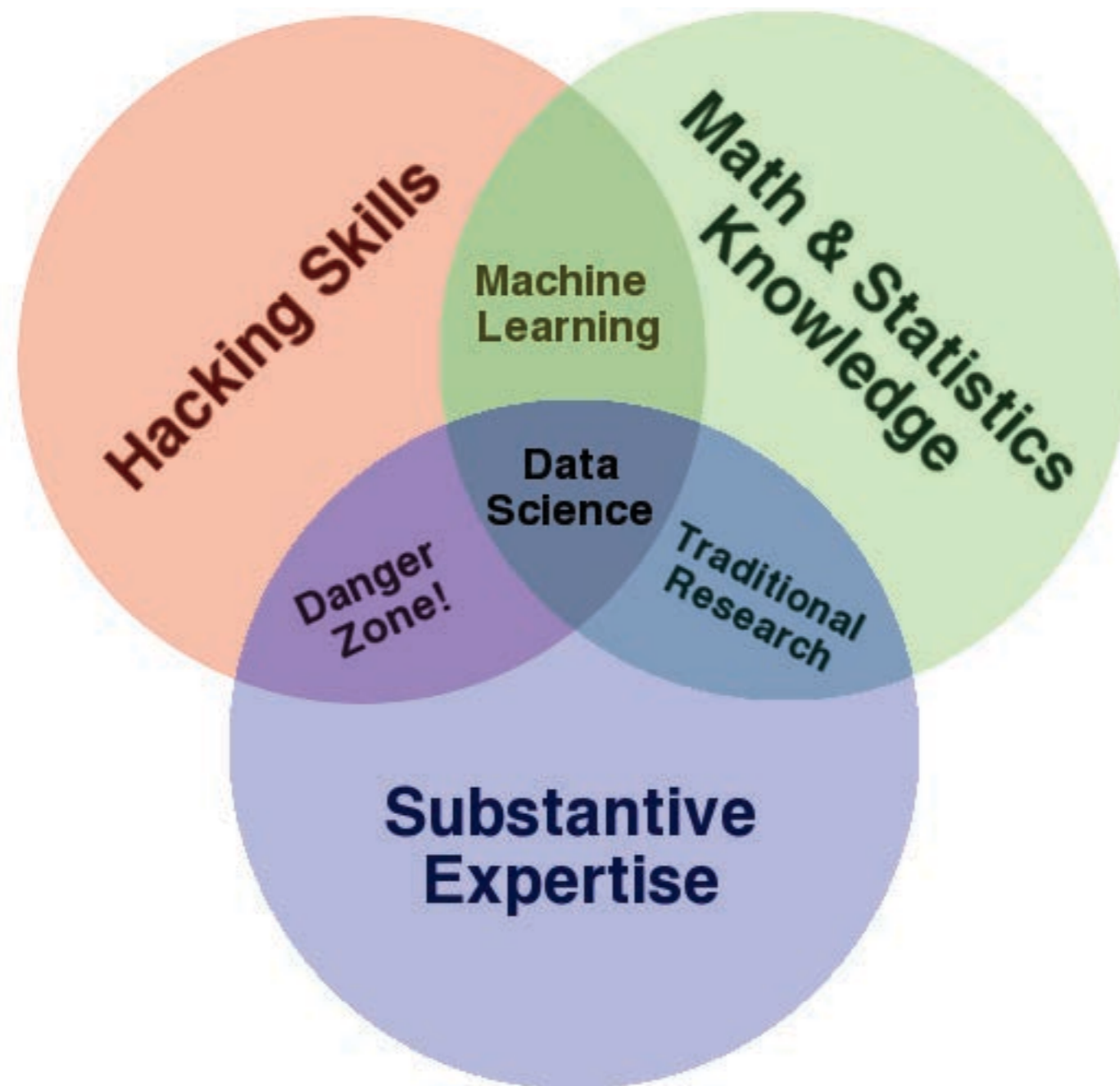
So, why do so many end up doing it?

What is the 'best' model?

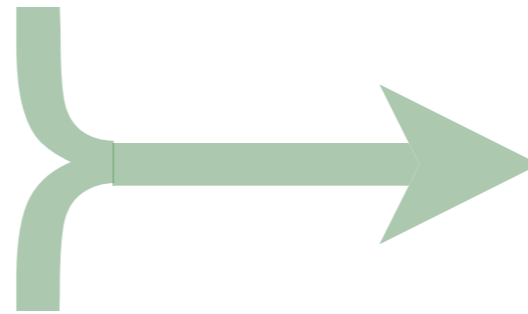
- ▶ Most predictive

Things data scientist like...

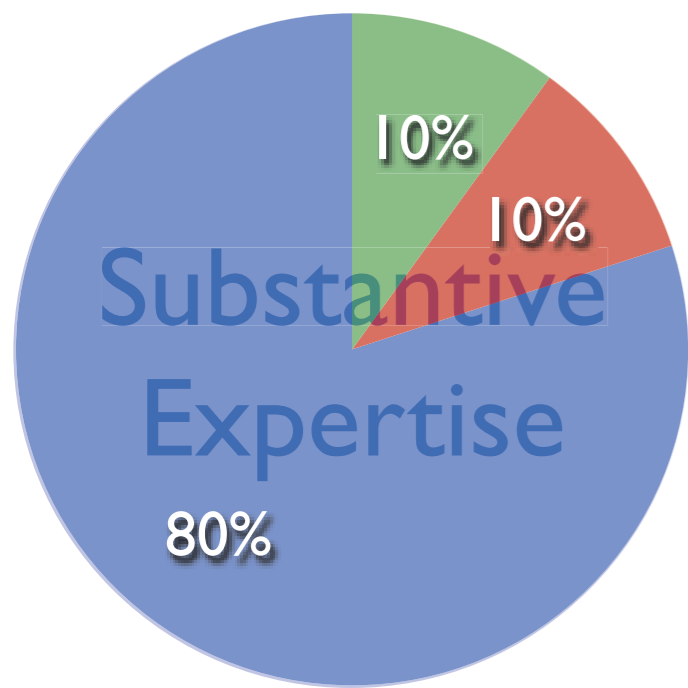
- ▶ Illustrating the current state of the world
- ▶ Predicting future observations
- ▶ Classifying/ranking observations

- ▶ Testable theoretical models
- ▶ Natural experiments
- ▶ Causality

Interpret

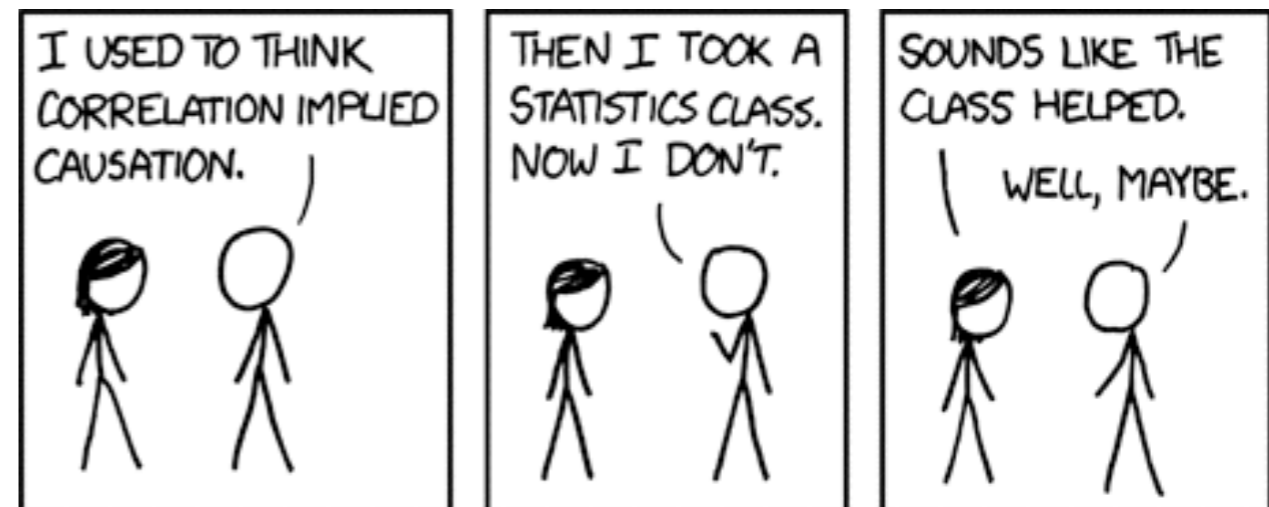
Focus on questions / not tech

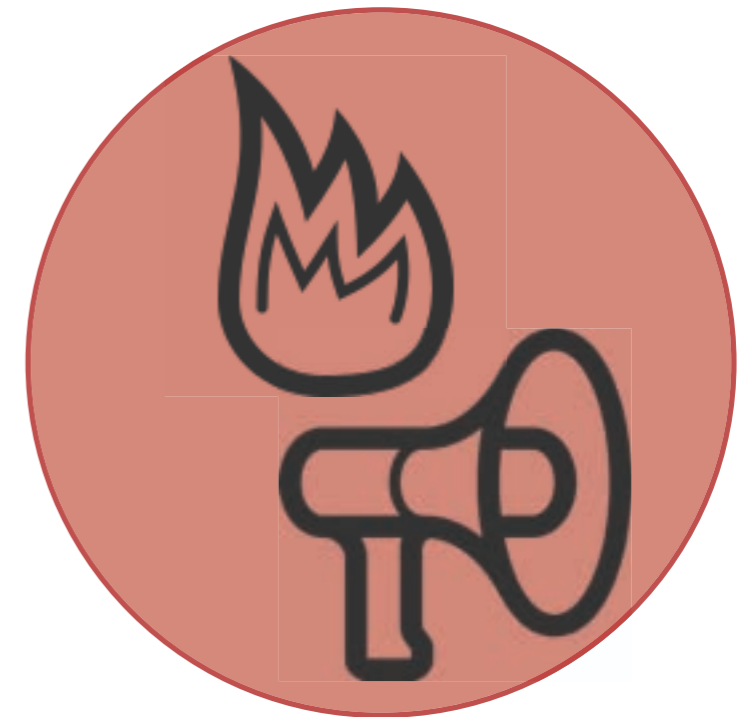

Re-ranking inspections significantly reduces the time that buildings are at risk of severe fire

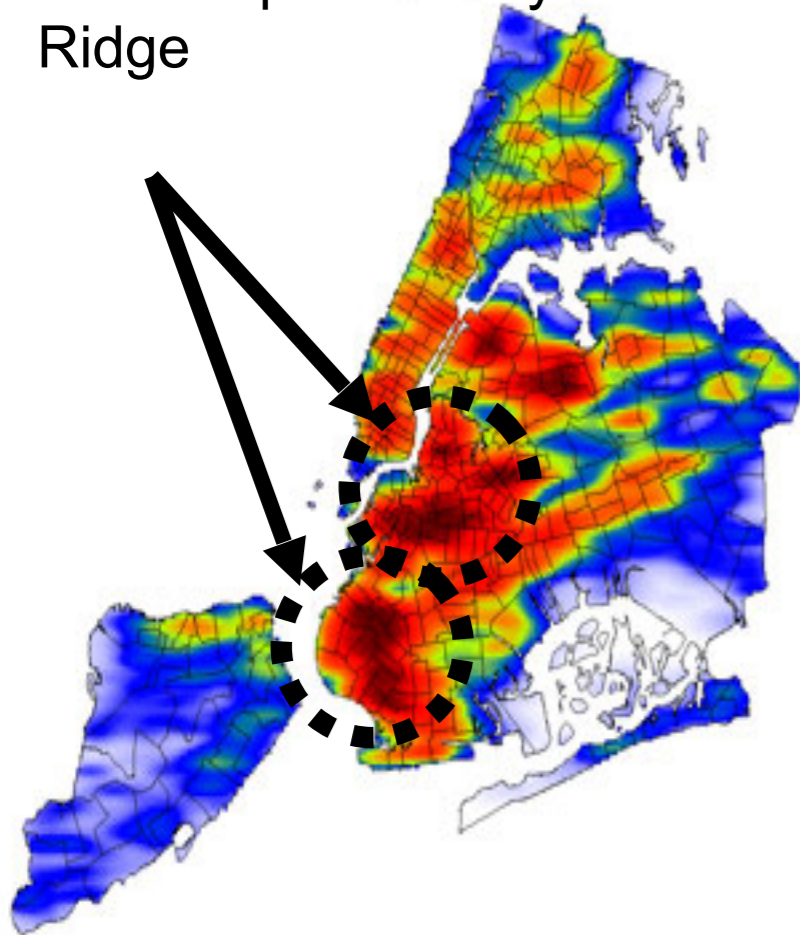
Day-to-day operations: FDNY RBIS

Improved results from RBIS update



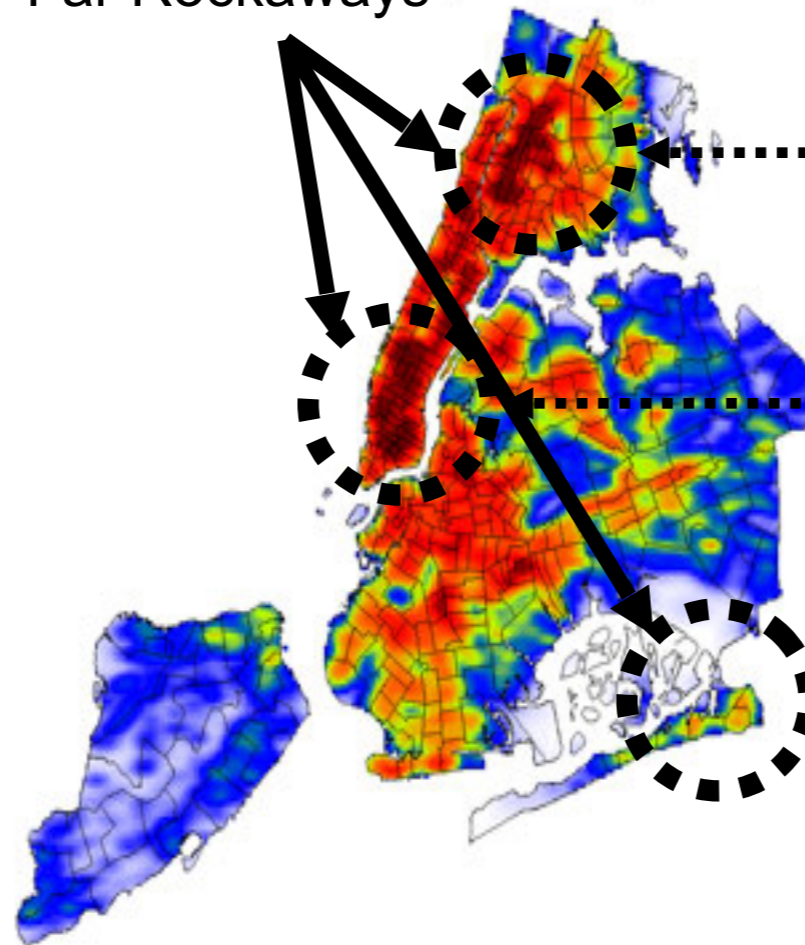
Original model

Original model over-predicted fires in Downtown Brooklyn, Park Slope and Bay Ridge



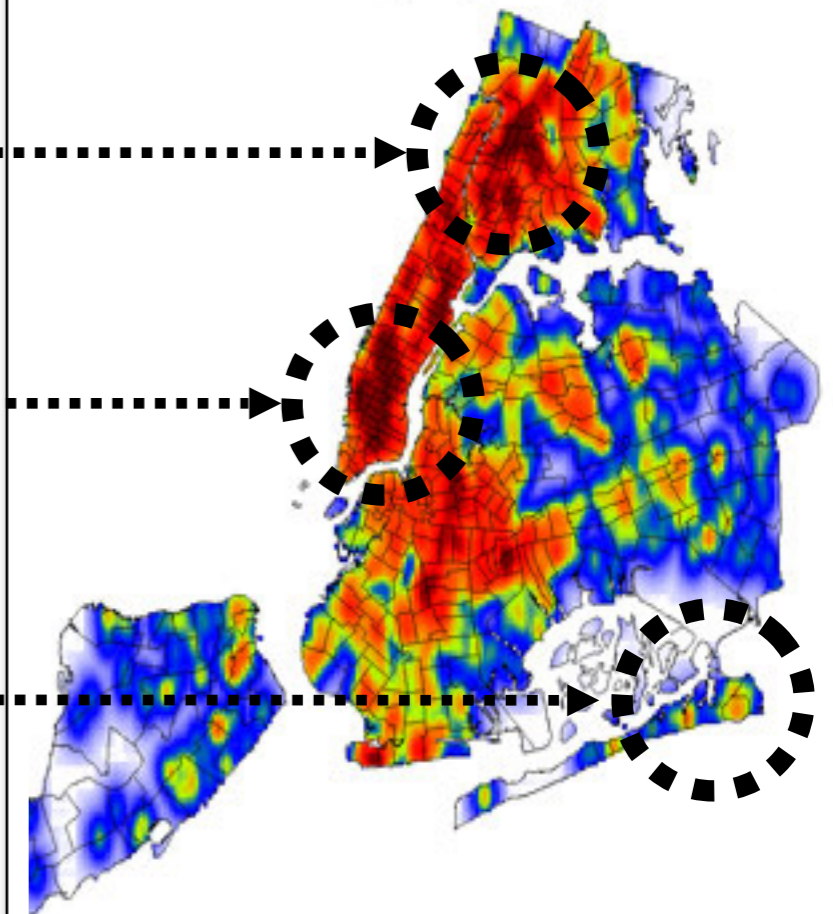
Updated model

Observed fire frequency, 2011 to present



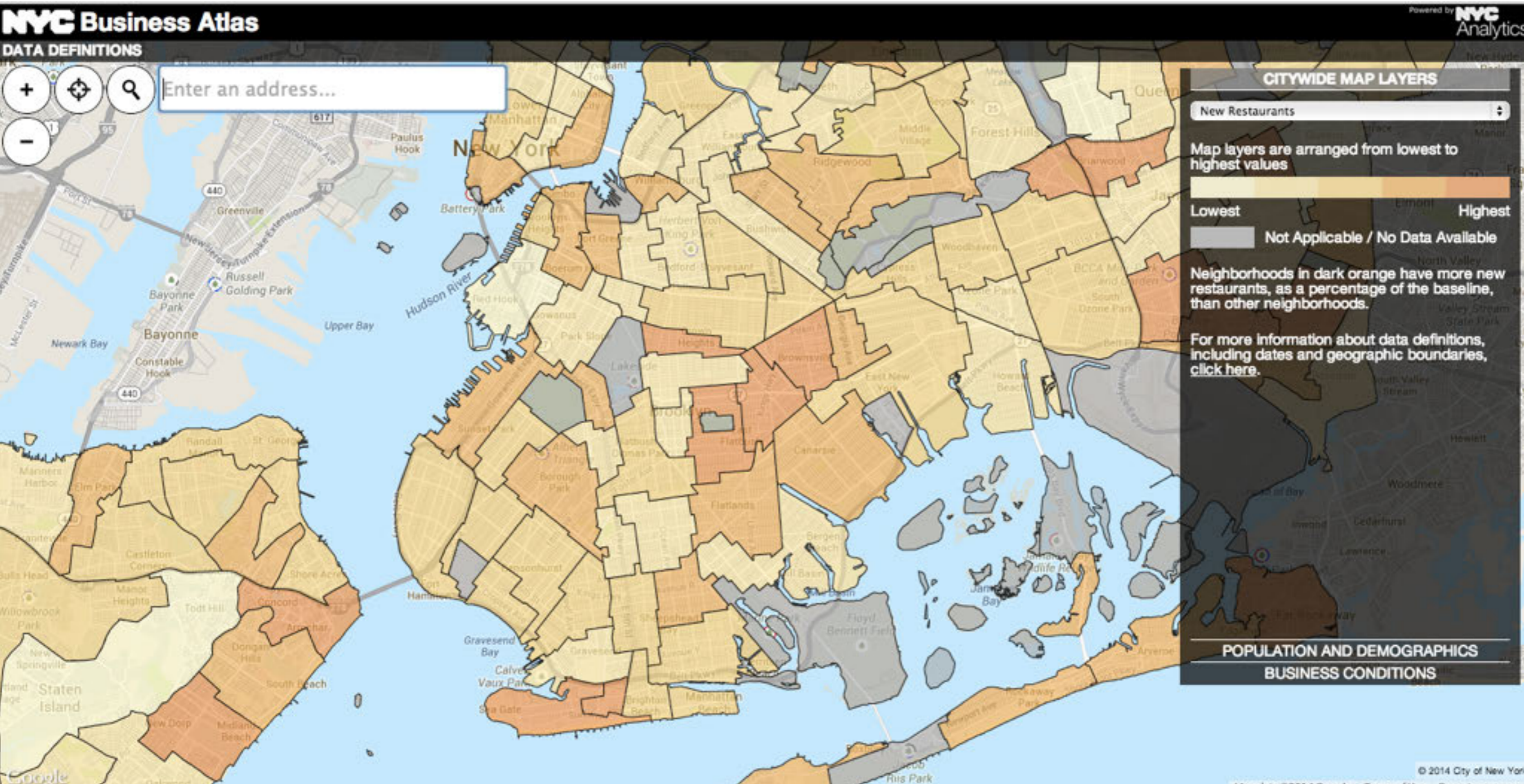

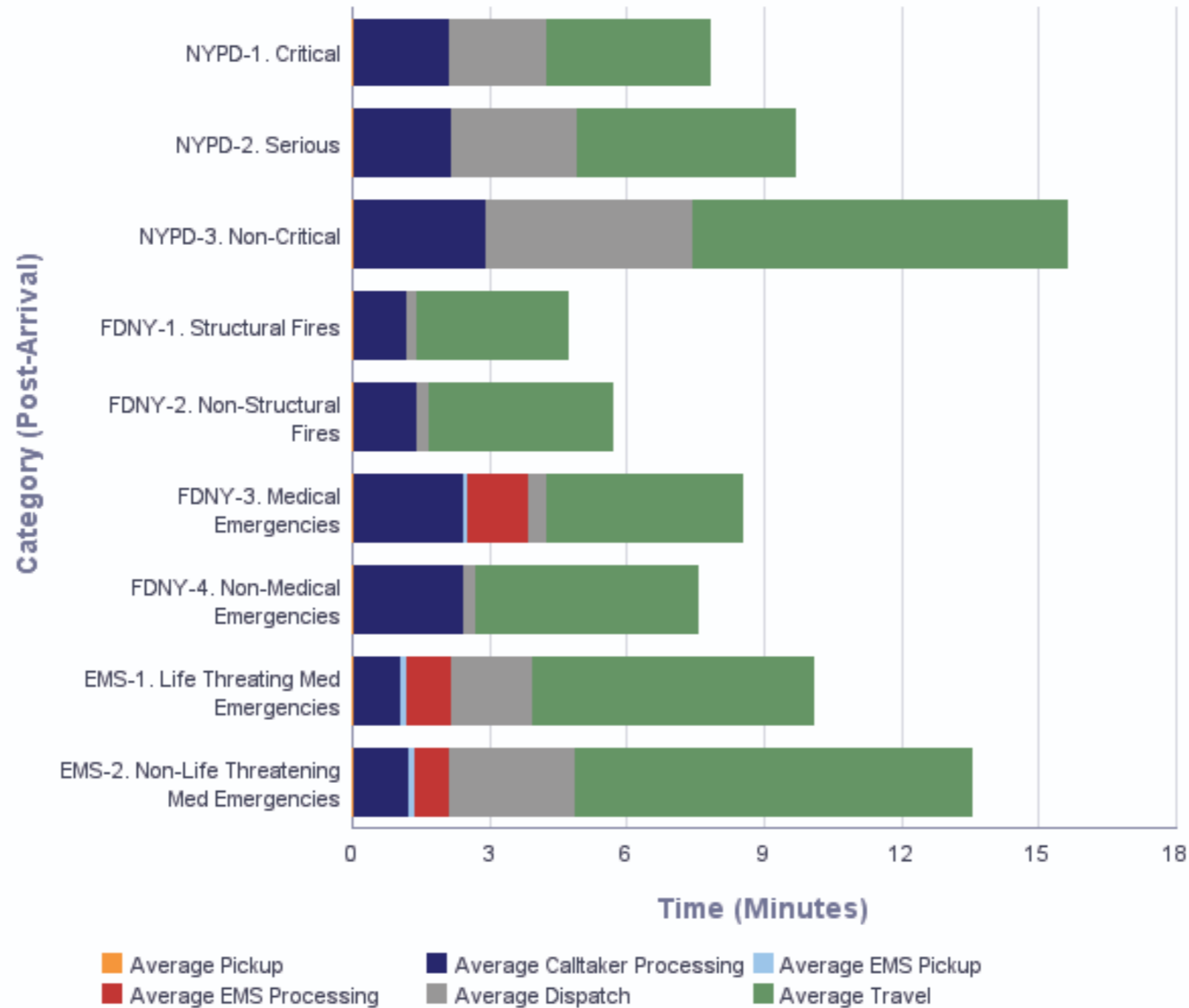
